Welcome to AGC's first newsletter. We hope you'll take a moment to review our postings and learn more about what we do. Most people take for granted their ability to read; it just "sorta happened" as we were growing up. But for some, it didn't happen at all. Trying harder or reading more books or working with a reading coach didn't really help. Falling further and further behind in school, not being able to compete with classmates, can cause behavior issues, self-esteem issues, and family stress.

AGC is a medical clinic that specializes in learning disorders and takes a neurological approach to treatment. AGC therapists train one brain at a time; the changes last a lifetime, like riding a bicycle. Read about "Mary" below.

Mary's Story

Mary's mom wrote this note to AGC: "A year ago I wouldn't have dreamed my daughter would be able to pick up and read instructions on her schoolwork, street signs, chapter books, or have options with which school she could attend. Today she can and she does. For the last 7 months we have walked through AGC's doors Mon. through Fri. Not once did Mary complain about going to tutoring or school here. We joke that this is the way her brain always wanted to be taught to read. It made sense to her and what she learned actually stuck. The <u>safe</u>, <u>encouraging</u>, and <u>warm</u> environment you as staff fostered enabled Mary to thrive while pushing her in ways, we didn't imagine were possible. A year ago I couldn't see our child's intelligence underneath her dyslexia. (continued on page 2)

5 Qs and 5 As

Q1: What makes AGC different? Are you not just another reading program?

A1: A reading program assumes there is no obstacle in the brain which prevents learning. AGC tests each child to diagnose the specific obstacles to learning, then develops an individualized plan to overcome those obstacles. AGC trains one brain at a time because a one-size-fits-all approach actually fits no one.

Q4: If I bring my child to AGC, what can I expect?

A4: First, a warm welcome, as the medical staff checks vital signs, reviews medical history and medications, and determines whether vision, hearing, or an ADHD assessment is needed. AGC's pediatrician will meet with you and your child to discuss your concerns and review your completed paperwork. Based on your child's needs, diagnostic testing will be discussed and scheduled. At your follow-up visit, test results and a personalized plan of action will be explained; we help educate you about the diagnoses and treatments. Additional therapies or psychological services, as needed, will be discussed. Parents are the cornerstone of success and are a vital partner in the therapy.

Q2: Why is a medical clinic seeking financial contributions?

A2: Very little of what AGC does is covered by insurance. Patient care is delivered by professionals and is reimbursed to a small degree. Many need reading intervention that is not covered by insurance and cannot afford it. AGC relies on generous donations to help those children in need.

Q5: How do I make an appointment?

Call or email our *Intake Coordinator* to receive AGC's pre-visit paperwork (includes intake, financial/insurance, NICHQ forms). Approximately, 2-4 weeks **after** returning the completed pre-visit forms, we will call you to set up an appointment. All clients can be set up for therapy or enrichment intervention after visiting our pediatrician.

Q3: I'm 52 and have struggled with dyslexia all my life. Is there any help for me? A3: Yes! Visit our website, click on testimonials, and read the entry by the IT executive.
